Course objectives

Methodology



The methodological strategy proposes self-training as a transversal axis, however, it seeks the consolidation of a community of practice through the following resources:

Resource	What it is about
Initial questionnaire	Participants will find three initial questions to focus the topics that will be developed throughout the course
Pedagogical aids	In the course of the Virtual Learning Objectives participants will find pedagogical aids to guide their learning, such as: • Key Idea. • More information.
Virtual Learning Objects (VLOs)	During each week, you will have a Virtual Learning Object (VLO) where you will find the course content in an interactive way.
Interactive activities	You will find interactive activities that will allow you to reinforce the knowledge acquired in each of the weeks.
Collaborative boards	Asynchronous activity where you will be able to apply what you have learnt through practical exercises that you will carry out with the collective construction.
Webinar	Synchronous activity where experts will clarify your doubts and allow you to go deeper into the subject, and there will also be a space to exchange ideas based on the activity proposed at the beginning of the week.
Forum	Asynchronous activity, where exchanging ideas and getting to know each other's perspective is important, so we will open one forum per week so you can participate in the question posed.
Final questionnaire	Evaluate the knowledge acquired throughout the course by answering the proposed questions.





It is important that they participate in synchronous and asynchronous activities, and from the knowledge developed we will be able to consolidate the community of practice.
